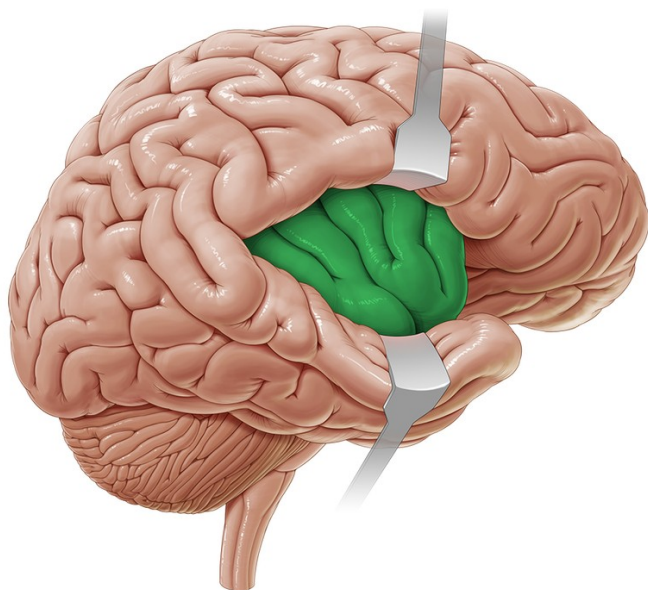


# ARC Alumni Special Feature
